Land Use Acknowledgment

Founded in 1860, Emmanuel Church is located on land once used by the matriarchal Massachusett Tribe for fishing in the estuary of the Quinobequin (now Charles River). Acknowledging this is an expression of our appreciation and a small, first step on the Way of Love, toward respect and accountability to Indigenous or First Peoples, who continue to suffer as a consequence of genocide and forced removal perpetrated by white ancestors of European descent. Our next steps have to do with actions to end violence directed toward them, which occurs when their histories are erased, cultures are trivialized, labor is exploited, and resources are seized. As the current occupiers of this territory, we must amplify First Peoples' voices, honor their dignity, and repent of our complicity in their oppression. 
The Lessons

First Reading Acts 11:1-18

Now the apostles and the believers who were in Judea heard that the Gentiles had also accepted the word of God. So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him, saying, "Why did you go to uncircumcised men and eat with them?" Then Peter began to explain it to them, step by step, saying, "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. There was something like a large sheet coming down from heaven, being lowered by its four corners; and it came close to me. As I looked at it closely I saw four-footed animals, beasts of prey, reptiles, and birds of the air. I also heard a voice saying to me, 'Get up, Peter; kill and eat.' But I replied, 'By no means, Lord; for nothing profane or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' But a second time the voice answered from heaven, 'What God has made clean, you must not call profane.' This happened three times; then everything was pulled up again to heaven. At that very moment three men, sent to me from Caesarea, arrived at the house where we were. The Spirit told me to go with them and not to make a distinction between them and us. These six brothers also accompanied me, and we entered the man's house. He told us how he had seen the angel standing in his house and saving, Send to Joppa and bring Simon, who is called Peter; he will give you a message by which you and your entire household will be saved. And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how he had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God, saying, "Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life."

The Baptism

Presider: The Candidate for Holy Baptism will now be presented. Parents & Godparents: We present Bodie Richard Coulon to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

Presider: Will you be responsible for seeing that the child you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life?

Parents & Godparents: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Will you by your prayers and witness help him to grow into the full stature of Christ? Parents & Godparents: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God? Parents & Godparents: I renounce them.

Presider: Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God? Parents & Godparents: I renounce them.

Presider: Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God? Parents & Godparents: I renounce them.

Presider: Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior? Parents & Godparents: I do.

Presider: Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love? Parents & Godparents: **I do.**

Presider: Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord? Parents & Godparents: **I do.**

The Presider addresses the congregation.

Presider: Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support Bodie in his life in Christ?

People: We will.

Presider: Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

Presider: Do you believe in God the Father?

People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Presider: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Presider: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Presider: Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers?People: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord?People: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ?People: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself?People: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?People: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Will you cherish the wondrous works of God, and protect the beauty and integrity of all creation?People: I will, with God's help.

Presider: Let us now pray for Bodie, who is to receive the Sacrament of new birth

Persons appointed lead the following petitions.

Leader: Deliver him, O Lord, from the way of sin and death. People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Open him to your grace and truth.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Fill him with your holy and life-giving Spirit. People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Keep him in the faith and communion of your holy Church.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Teach him to love others in the power of the Spirit.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Send him into the world in witness to your love.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Bring himto the fullness of your peace and glory. People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Presider: Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. **Amen.**

Presider:The Lord be with you.People:And also with you.

Presider: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. People: It is right to give God thanks and praise. Presider: We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life.

We thank you, O God, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. Amen.

Bodie Richard, I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier Amen.

Let us pray. Heavenly God, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon your servant Bodie the forgiveness of sin, and have raised him to the new life of grace. Sustain him, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give him an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. Amen.

Bodie Richard, you are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. Amen.



The Great Thanksgiving





Presider: Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love. You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace. But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Gluten-free wafers are available upon request, as well as non-alcoholic grape juice in the ceramic chalice *All without exception are welcome to receive. You who hunger and thirst for deeper communion with the Holy One come to the table.*

As you receive communion, we ask that you refrain from dipping the bread in the cup. As an alternative, please sip from the cup or hold your bread over the cup without touching the cup as the chalice is presented.

B-SAFE & B-LOVE 2025 – The Bishop's Summer Academic and Fun Enrichment

Each year we join with many others to support the summer day-camp activities organized by St. Stephen's Youth Programs (http://www.ssypboston.org/). There are many fun activities planned along with the all-important academic support that all children need in the summer months.

Emmanuel has signed up for something we did successfully the last four years—B-LOVE. Partnering with our friends at Central Reformed Temple, we will be supporting B-SAFE families for one of the four weeks on Thursday, July 25, with bags full of groceries. There is hardship with many families to provide adequate meals during the summer school vacation.

Here is the new two-fold plan for this summer: First, our specific assignment is to fill 25 grocery bags with nonperishable items (contact us at info@emmanuelchurch.org for a detailed list of groceries and a copy of the sign-up sheet to follow shortly). Items can be ordered through Amazon, for example, and delivered directly to Alston Abbey.

Second, we will include a \$25 Gift Card with each bag (also included in the sign-up sheet) so that the families can purchase perishable items. The bags with gift cards will be delivered to St. Stephen's in the South End, by a few volunteer drivers.

The aim is to help meet family needs during these times of continued economic upheaval and higher food prices. If you wish, there are other opportunities to volunteer at St. Stephen's, 419 Shawmut Street. (https://www.ssypboston.org/bsafe).

Worship Today in Lindsey Chapel

Are you visiting Emmanuel for the first time today? Our congregation moves into the beautiful Lindsey Chapel during the summer. The chapel was built by William and Anne Lindsey, in memory of their newlywed daughter, Leslie Lindsey and her spouse Stewart Mason, who both tragically passed away on the Lusitania.

The chapel, originally a brownstone, was purchased by the Lindseys in 1919 and offered to the church as a memorial chapel. It was built in the style of a Lady Chapel, a space meant to honor the Blessed Mother.

We also have a long history of attracting deeply thoughtful people to engage in faith, doubt, music and art, conversation and fine liturgy. If you would like to learn more, please contact the Parish Office so we can connect.

In Episcopal liturgy, please stand in body or spirit when indicated. If you prefer to kneel during the prayers, please do. Please join in with the text in bold, when indicated. Hymns and responses to the liturgy usually found in the Hymnal 1982, Book of Common Prayer, and others are included in the bulletin. Our scripture readings are prescribed by the Revised Common Lectionary and are taken from the NRSV translation of the Bible. Psalm translations often come from the St. Helena Psalter.

Our commitment to expansive language dates from January 19, 1986, when the vestry vowed that our worship should "...speak of God, Christ, and our humanity in both male and female images." Thirty-five years later, we continue to expand our language to embrace non-binary and gender-fluid words for people and the Divine, as well as nonanthropomorphic words for the Divine that are theologically coherent and biblically grounded. In accordance with this commitment, we welcome everyone to make changes in the language of the liturgy and in the hymns to that which is more fully inclusive. Our rector considers the disturbances this causes to be signs of the Holy Spirit, even as she acknowledges that words will always be insufficient to describe the Mystery of Life and Love.

In the sixth century, **the "filioque" clause** referring to the Holy Spirit crept into the Nicene Creed in the Church in the West (Roman) without consultation or agreement from the Church in the East (Orthodox): "...Holy Spirit, who proceeds from the Father **and the Son**." The Episcopal Church meeting in General Convention in 1994 agreed to remove the clause in the next revision of the Book of Common Prayer. In the meantime, since Emmanuel Church prints the creed text in our bulletins, we have removed the clause and adjusted musical settings to put the Episcopal Church's intention into practice. In our worship service, **there are periods of silence** which serve as transitions and moments of reflection within a rich liturgy. In scripture, silence lets Elijah hear the still small voice of God, and the Revelation to John speaks of the silence in heaven. You are encouraged to embrace this silence as an integral part of "God with us."

Whoever you are, wherever you've been, whatever you've done, **you are welcome to participate in communion here**. At this time communion may be received by bread alone or by praying the Prayer of Spiritual Communion.

Children are welcome to participate fully in the service.

It is our practice to remain seated through the **Postlude**. You are encouraged to respond "Amen" at its conclusion.

In a typical week, Emmanuel Church provides sanctuary and hospitality for as many as fifteen hundred people who are living on the various margins of our society because of race, class, gender, sexual orientation, disability, addiction, immigration status, religion, and so on. Coming together to help lift heavy hearts and carry heavy burdens is what we do, and many hands make light work. Every single one of us has some capacity to join in this vital mission, thanks to Love.
